What to do

Shop for gifts from artisans and craftsmen at the **Grand Central Terminal holiday market**. While you're there, watch the famed Sky Ceiling in the Main Concourse brought to life with a seasonal light and music celebration in the Holiday Laser Light Show beginning Nov. 23. Just want to **window shop**? New York's renowned department stores offer eyefuls of festive delight. A sampling of celebrated window displays includes Saks Fifth Avenue at 611 Fifth Ave.; Macy's Herald Square at 151 W. 34th St.; Lord & Taylor at 424 Fifth Ave.; Bloomingdale's at 1000 Third Ave.; Tiffany & Co. at 727 Fifth Ave.; and a newly remodeled FAO Schwarz at 767 Fifth Ave.

A hint from savvy window shoppers — wait until after closing hours to take in the displays because the crowds will be smaller.

NYC on a budget

Want to save the bucks for shopping?

Skip the hotel, and **stay in a youth hostel**. Shared dorms cost around \$25-\$35 a night, with private rooms in the \$40 range. Try these: Hostelling International New York at 891 Amsterdam Ave., (212) 932-2300; Jazz on the Park-Hostel, 36 W. 106th St. at Central Park West, (212) 932-1600; and Chelsea Center, 313 W. 29th St., (212) 643-0214. For a rush of New York culture, **take the subway** — it's cheaper than a taxi and quicker than walking. Cost is \$2. A one-day Fun Pass is \$7; a 7-day pass is \$21.

Join the studio audience at **The Daily Show** with Jon Stewart, which tapes at 5:45 p.m. Monday through Thursday. Call (212) 586-2477 to request free tickets. *Daily Show* studios are at 513 W. 54th St.

Take a cruise on the free **Staten Island Ferry** and see the lower Manhattan skyline, harbor and Statue of Liberty. The ferry leaves from the terminal at Whitehall and South streets in Lower Manhattan every 15-30 minutes from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. weekdays and every hour on weekends.

Once you're there, the regular garden at the **Staten Island Botanical Garden** is open from dawn until dusk at no charge. The garden is located at 1000 Richmond Terrace, Staten Island, (718) 273-8200, www.sibg.org.

Walk around and admire the decorations. Holiday colors top the Empire State Building, red and green for Christmas and blue and white for Hanukkah, at 350



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Fifth Ave., two miles of holiday trees will illuminate Park Avenue and starting Dec. 8, the first night of Hanukkah, a flame will be lit atop the world's largest menorah at Fifth Avenue and 59th Street.



How to get to NYC Train — Amtrak: \$124 round trip. Travel time is 7 hours one way. For more: www.amtrak.com **Bus — Greyhound:** \$78 advance purchase; \$135 standard fare. Travel time is 7½ hours. For more info: www.greyhound.com **Car — drive yourself:** It's 330 miles from Rochester to Manhattan, so figure that gas will cost about \$60 for a round trip; travel time is about 6 to 7 hours — unless you speed or arrive during rush hour. Park the car once you're there: It's easier to get around on foot, by subway or taxi. Parking costs about \$30 for 24 hours, depending on where you park.
